If you need inspiration for making some ornaments, the first website to consult is our Guild Newsletter page (http://www.chinookwoodturning.org/index.php? option=com content&view=article&id=20&Ite mid=226). If you select the November and December issues of 2019 and each previous years, you will find a tremendous collection of Christmas ornaments turned by you and our colleagues over the years.

A favourite work of mine is the Nativity scene published by UK turner Colwin Way (this

Newsletter, April 2022) in the Woodturning Magazine September 2019 issue #335. Colwin mentioned that he was inspired by the 1991 work of German turner Björn Köhler (https:// bjoern-koehler.de/en/christmas/; more on this turner next month). You will find two YouTube videos from Colwin (https://youtu.be/j-o1GO-Nuu4; https://youtu.be/ie0C8wv5VyI) about making the figurines of his Nativity scene. Colwin is a wonderful and dexterous turner. This makes up for all the annoying adds and questions about products of the manufacturer sponsoring his channel. Chris Back, another UK turner has also nice variation on this project (https://bachwoodworks.co.uk/nativityscenes/). Mike Peace, who did one of the first remote demonstration in 2020 as a guest of the Edmonton Woodturners club (https:// edmontonwoodturners.ca) has also a video on Nativity scenes (https://youtu.be/ 9 Mijl bGY; https://youtu.be/DA2QXXICW0o) and a file on approximate size of the figurines from his website (https://view.officeapps.live.com/op/ v i e w . a s p x ?src=https%3A%2F%2Fwww.mikepeacewoodtu rning.com%2Fwpcontent%2Fuploads%2F2020%2F12%2FNativi <u>tv-Scene-Figures-</u> H.O..docx&wdOrigin=BROWSELINK). In any case, if you have an interest in Nativity scenes, our own Norm Robinson is working on this project. He has developed different tips while doing it. 

RE"TURN" of the ANNUAL CHRISTMAS TREE FESTIVAL

/ith the re"turn" of the 28th Annual Christmas Tree Festival, November 20 - 23, we will need many ornaments made by the members as our Guild will be decorating a tree. In the past, we had a beautiful tree with 150-200 ornaments. This year, to no surprise, the slim tree is not available due to the ever changing chain-supply issue, we will have a full tree to decorate so I believe that we might need 250 ornaments to fill the tree. It would be great if you could bring your ornaments at the regular meeting on October 20th to get the momentum going on our Guild activity. May I remind you that the profits of this activity are going to the Chinook Regional Hospital Foundation and we will all benefit from this as soon or later in our life we will need to stop by the hospital for us or a loved ones. In 2019, our tree went for \$2400 which is a very nice contribution to the Foundation. I will take ornaments also at the regular meeting on November 17 as well and at home if you are absent from the meeting. If you are running late, let me know how many ornaments you will be supplying. But you can imagine that the stress level always decreases a lot when we have several ornaments in October. This year I am the Captain for the CWG team. If you need inspiration, please look at my website chronicle, there are suggestions for different ornaments although a nativity scene might be too heavy for the tree. A few volunteers will also be needed to set up the tree on Saturday morning, November 19 from 9:00 am until 11:30 or so for a lot of fun setting up the ornaments. Please let me know if you can help.

BEADS of COURAGE

Guidelines for Turned Treasure Boxes:

- 1. In order to hold the beads, turned boxes for the Beads of Courage program need to be about 6 inches in diameter (5 inches minimum) and 5 inches deep (4 inches minimum).
- 2. If possible, have "Beads of Courage" engraved or burned in the lid, or leave a place to insert a bead.
 - The round bead sizes are: 3/4 + " with a thickness of 5/16" or 1 1/4" with a 3/16" thickness. There is a rectangle bead that is $3/4" \times 15/16"$ with a thickness of 5/16".
- 3. Make sure the lids are easily removable. Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate.
- 4. Finishing:
 - Children who receive these boxes are susceptible to germs/infections/mold. Bowls that have not been properly sealed can harbor mold. Ensure you are using a safe finishing process that does not contain toxic materials. Do not use finishes like linseed or walnut oil that take a long time to outgas.
 - Do not paint Beads of Courage boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, stain, and/or burning.
- 5. John (John VandenBerg fayjohn@shaw.ca, ph. 403-380-0141) has the beads to be glued on after the box is finished. He has a limited number of them so will give them out, one per box, when you have a box ready. Contact him to request a bead.
- 6. Please complete a donation form with your finished box or bowl. You can get the forms at the Beads of Courage Canada website, or John VandenBerg will have copies of them.
