This is an annual event put on by the Lethbridge Public Library to promote literacy and interest in books in general. ANDRÉ'S PREFERRED WEB SITES OF THE MONTH

he Art of Wood Exhibition 2023 is an annual competition organized by the National Association of Woodworkers Inc. in New Zealand and the results were made public just a few days ago (https://exhibition.naw.org.nz/). There are ten categories in which participants could submit their works ranging from bowls, hollow forms, platters. For our enjoyment, the competition is dominated by the woodturner membership. By clicking on each category tab, you will find exceptional works by different Kiwi turners. This is real candy for the eyes and the soul. Take time to see and enjoy each work. This is absolutely wonderful woodturning. Of course, you could cheat and go directly to the Award tab (or stay on the main page) and find the best pieces from every category but you would deny yourself of the pleasure of seeing all the amazing work submitted by many exceptional turners. For a second year in a row, Robbie Graham was the extraordinary turner this year clinching the "Supreme" award, with an amazing hollow form called "Phi" made from a single piece of black maire (Nestegis cunninghamil) a spectacular native species of New Zealand. A close runner up was Tery Scott with many pieces including the magnificent hollow form called "Pohutukawa at Christmas" representing a full-size flower (30 cm - 12" tall) of this native New Zealand tree that blooms at Christmas time. Be assured that you will treasure every moment spent on this site.

With the upcoming 29th Annual Christmas Tree Festival, next month, our Guild will be again contributing to the decoration of a tree, it is timely to visit some sites related to Christmas ornaments. If you need inspiration for making some ornaments, the first website to consult is our Guild Newsletter page (http://www.chinookwoodturning.org/index.php? option=com content&view=article&id=20&Itemid=226). If you select the November and December issues from last year and from 2019 and each previous years, you will find a tremendous collection of Christmas ornaments turned by you and our colleagues over the years.

A second site to consult is the announcement of the **Christmas Ornament Challenge 2023** (https://youtu.be/wzQvdHYhhlo?si=pSQrUH6ke2LHY0Ir) put forward by Allan Stratton (AsWoodTurns) and Matt Deighton (Woodturners Worldwide). Starting at 5:30 of the video you will find the contributions from last year's challenge, all very interesting and surely inspiring. Now that you have the site information you could also contribute a photo of your best ornament and perhaps become a winner of one of the many prizes to be awarded. Mike Peace (www.mikepeacewoodturning.com) who did a remote demonstration for us in 2020, has many videos on YouTube as well about turning and assembling different Christmas ornaments. After this, if you are not quite sure you found the inspiration for the perfect Christmas ornament(s) yet, type "woodturning Christmas ornaments" in the search box of YouTube. You will find hundreds of suggestions. Then, it will be time to turn ornaments for the Christmas tree.

BEADS of COURAGE

Try to remember the Beads of Courage program as you go about your daily routines and, if you find the time and have the inclination, please make some boxes and tops for the kids.

Guidelines for Turned Treasure Boxes:

- 1. In order to hold the beads, turned boxes for the Beads of Courage program need to be about 6 inches in diameter (5 inches minimum) and 5 inches deep (4 inches minimum).
- If possible, have "Beads of Courage" engraved or burned in the lid, or leave a place to insert a bead.
 - The round bead sizes are: 3/4 + " with a thickness of 5/16" or 1 1/4" with a 3/16" thickness. There is a rectangle bead that is $3/4" \times 15/16"$ with a thickness of 5/16".
- 3. Make sure the lids are easily removable. Any finials should be easy for a small child to grasp and not too elaborate.
- 4. Finishing:
 - Children who receive these boxes are susceptible to germs/infections/mold. Bowls that have not been properly sealed can harbor mold. Ensure you are using a safe finishing process that does not contain toxic materials. Do not use finishes like linseed or walnut oil that take a long time to outgas.
 - Do not paint Beads of Courage boxes. Instead, highlight the beauty of the wood with clear varnish, stain, and/or burning.
- 5. John (John VandenBerg fayjohn@shaw.ca, ph. 403-380-0141) has the beads to be glued on after the box is finished. He has a limited number of them so will give them out, one per box, when you have a box ready. Contact him to request a bead.
- 6. Please complete a donation form with your finished box or bowl. You can get the forms at the Beads of Courage Canada website, or John VandenBerg will have copies of them.
