Some Interesting Links:

During our Oct (2015) meeting this example was used while we were discussing form. This is a large vase that was re-turned to adjust the form of the piece. This example was presented with the permission of Herman de Vries, the founder of the WOWS.com, a website devoted to turners.

The back story. after having this on display in his home, Herman became unhappy with the form as a result of his evolving understanding of form. He re-mounted it on his lathe, removed the beads on the shoulder, changed the cove under the lip so it is a proper U shaped cove instead of a V, reduced the foot and tucked it under so it was not flat footed.

Two questions were asked 1) why the colour difference and 2) was the rim thinned down. I asked Herm about this and here is his reply:

"The rim is a hair thinner in order to put a proper U shaped cove under the lip.

The color difference is due to patina, and a bit because of when and where the photo was taken. The new version is lighter, but will darken."

Many thanks to Herm for providing this excellent example of what can be done.

The Chinook Woodturning Guild was fortunate to have master woodturner Walt Wager offer to do a demonstration at our September 17th general meeting.

We were lucky that Jim Jones is a member of the Calgary Woodturners as well as our Guild. When Jim learned that Walt was coming through southern Alberta and offering to demo in Calgary he contacted me and I immediately sent an email to Walt offering accommodation at my place and asking if he might have time or inclination to demo for our Guild. To my delight he said OK.

Walt is an experienced teacher from Tallahassee, Florida, where he is Studio Coordinator and Resident Instructor at Camelot's Woodworking Studio. In the AAW he has served as a videographer during the past

three symposiums. He is also the program coordinator for the Tallahassee, FL chapter, North Florida Woodturners, and a demonstrator on the 2014 Norweigian Woodturning Cruise. Check him out at: waltwager.com

Walt was accompanied by his wife Barbara. While not a turner herself, she is a professional educator and provides Walt with input on how the demos are working. Most of us could use such useful comment.

Walt Wager's demo was about texturing and colouring turned pieces. He discussed texturing using the Merlin rotary tool with various of its attachments, and went on to demonstrate a wide variety of products for colouring and enhancing woodturnings. So much was covered that I couldn't keep the products straight in my mind, however, ever thoughtful Walt has supplied a guide which is available on our website.

After the demo Walt and Barbara stayed behind and helped Vern and me put away the video system, TV cabinet, sound system, tools, and lathe. Barbara stacked the chairs while we swept the floor. More than we usually ask of our guests
