Recap of the 2009-2010 Guild year

As this is the last issue of the current Guild year we thought it might be useful to recap how the year went.

Membership - this year we welcomed 11 new members to the Guild and ended the year with 35 paid members.

Newsletter - this year we implemented a regular newsletter and published 9 issues. Some issues have been shorter than others but we have tried to keep you informed and provide useful information about the guild and its activities. Unfortunately we did miss one month during the year.

Training - in addition to demos at meetings and sawdust sessions, we had 2 outside demonstrators - Ron Falconer & Jimmy Clewes. We also documented and held a 1 day Introduction to Turning course for beginning turners. This is the 1st course we have developed and the beginning of a series of courses we want to develop and have available for the future. The course outline is now in a training binder and we plan to try to develop at least 1 additional course each year so that over time we will have a library of courses that can be offered as needed.

Resource Binder - this year we developed and distributed a resource binder with 29 of our members choosing to participate. During the year we distributed 13 additional articles for the binder.

Equipment - thanks to Clair we now have a cabinet to house and organize our Guild Library. Also thanks to Suzi we have a tail stock swing out for our General lathe. We also acquired another chuck so that all our lathes now have a chuck.

Community Involvement - This year we again participated in the Art Walk in conjunction with the Galt Museum. We participated in the Bowman Arts Fall & Spring sales, with very satisfying results.

We began collecting Christmas tree ornaments for the Hospital fund raising event. Unfortunately the event was canceled because of flu epidemic protocols at the hospital. The ornaments we collected will give us a good start for the 2010 fund raiser.

At the fall Bowman sale we sold tops and raised about \$84 for the food bank.

Guild Library

One of the books I recommend for Wood Turners of all levels is "The Fundamentals of Woodturning by Mike Darlow. As the title implies it covers woodturning from how to start to hollow turning, the eleven chapters are full of information on how to proceed and there are lessons on just about every aspect of the craft with much attention to detail. There are several exercises which give the beginner in depth instructions on the use of tools which can be applied to all woodturning projects, the information is such that it can also be useful to turners who wish to revisit some of the fundamentals of turning to hone their skills in long forgotten techniques. It covers mistakes that are made in the turning process and gives detailed instructions on correcting them.

The information goes from basic needs like lathes and equipment, safety, wood selection and tools to producing satisfying works of art. I have a personal copy that I used when I first started turning and have found it to be an excellent reference for maintaining the ability to perform the correct techniques. It is without doubt a publication worthy of a place on any woodturners library shelf.

The Guild Library copy is available to all members and is definitely a must for beginners who will find it an excellent learning tool, especially as an addition to Hands On instruction. Harold

Tip of the Month

When applying a finish to your turning on the lathe, use paper towels rather than a cloth or rag. Paper toweling will break apart if it gets wrapped around the turning while the lathe is spinning whereas a rag or cloth will not. The cloth will act like a rope and if your fingers get caught up in it, will drag your hand into the turning with drastic results.

It is also a good idea to spread out the applicator (cloth/paper towel) until it dries rather than scrunched up into a ball, then store it in an air-tight container until properly disposed of in order to avoid a fire from spontaneous combustion.

If you use steel wool, be aware it is flammable & care should be taken with it.

Spontaneous combustion can ruin your day.
