# **Training & Mentoring**

We ran our first training course Apr 25, 2010 with 7 participants. It was a full day and while we weren't able to accomplish all that we set out to do, we felt it was a worthwhile day and we learned some things to apply to future offerings.

Below is a review of the workshop by Tyler White, one of the participants.

"Introduction to Woodturning" April 25, 2010 It was a busy weekend for Lethbridge and area wood turners. It started out with the Bowman Arts Spring Sale in which a number of you did very well, but it was the end of the weekend that was good for us all. It was the first ever Workshop/Course "Introduction to Woodturning". It was a great way to learn the basics of turning, using the tools as they come from the store.

The morning started out with a quick introduction to the lathe with safety lesson to follow. Then we got right into it. First off we learned how to mount a piece of wood onto the lathe and different methods of mounting wood. The first tool we learned to use was the roughing gouge. It started out with quick explanation with some diagrams to start out then a demonstration, with practice time after that. We were given a block of wood and were to make it round and to make sure to "Ride the Bevel". After our blank was round, we learned how to use the next tool, the parting tool. There was another explanation of use and a demonstration and then we were supposed to mark lines on our blank and then using the parting tool make groves in the blank to prepare to make beads. That brings us to the next tool, the spindle gouge. We used the spindle gouge to create a bead by riding the bevel and making a curve on each side. After we had practice time on the spindle gouge and making bevels we learned our next tool which was a doozy to get the right feel for, the skew. You really had to be careful with this tool because if you caught a wrong edge it could go wrong very fast. This for myself took the longest to understand how it works

and how to hit the sweet spot. Following the long practice period, we started to run out of time, so we were not able to practice the bowl gouge but we got a demonstration on the tool and on bowl turning. At the end there was a quick demonstration on using scrapers.

I personally feel this day was a great experience to learn the right techniques for basic turning. Even though I have been turning for about a year now, I learned a lot of good techniques that I did not know before. I would suggest this course to anyone that is starting out or to anyone that is just getting back into turning. This course was a great experience and I think it should be put on again. Tyrel White

#### Tip of the Month

This month there are 2 for the price of one.

1) Have you ever sanded a piece and just as you are finishing up, discovered a deep scratch you are sure wasn't there a moment ago and had to go back and start over again. The scratch probably came from a loose piece of grit from a courser paper used earlier. As some sand papers are used they self sharpen by fracturing the grit particles. Sometimes particles are torn off the surface off the paper. The fractured or loose particles are shed off and get mixed in with the sanding dust or sometimes are imbedded in the wood. Later these particles are picked up by the finer grade of sandpaper and create those mysterious and unexpected scratches.

It is a good idea to clean off sanding dust & from inside bowls and to inspect for any imbedded grit between grits, particularly when using the courser grits of sandpaper.

2) laser caliper.

Many turners have a number of calipers he uses to measure wall thicknesses of bowls and hollow forms, even if it is only his thumb and fore finger.

Sometimes the right shaped caliper to reach into a form isn't available or doesn't allow the arms to line up at 90 degrees to the wall resulting in a misleading reading. In the bottom of a hollow form or bowl, calipers are useless because the tenon and supporting (unturned bulk) interfere with the outside leg of the caliper.


This laser caliper is very flexible. It is a simple U shape with a laser pointer fixed to the end of one arm and the other arm adjustable in length. (See sketch below) It can either be set for the desired wall thickness or set to the thinnest wall

thickness of the piece being measured. By tracing the inside arm around the inside of the bowl, the pointer shows a visual comparison of the inside form to the outside wall so that you can determine what needs to be made thinner for a consistent wall thickness. It is particularly useful in the bottom or foot area in determining how deep the bottom is into the tenon. It helps visualize the bottom of the bowl and helps to avoid the "dreaded funnel"

This is not a replacement for more conventional calipers but rather an additional tool for your bag of tricks.

The laser pointer is available from the Dollar Store for \$1.25 and the frame made from doweling and scrap lumber.

When using this tool it is important to keep it level and at the centre of the bowl (at spindle centre) otherwise you will get an inaccurate measurement
