President's Message

What is the point of woodturning demos? The executive of our guild spends a fair amount of time and energy organizing demonstrations every month for our regular meetings as well as public demonstrations several times a year and we also put on a major demonstration coupled with a workshop each spring. We always



get support from our members which is much appreciated. But it raises the question of why we do this and whether we should continue.

Obviously the public demos are designed to raise awareness of woodturning and of our club and maybe attract a few new members. These demos are fun to do when there is a crowd, even when the crowd is mostly kids hoping to score a spinning top hot off the lathe. It gives us a chance to meet people we would not ordinarily run across and talk about what we do. It also gets us out of our solitary workshops and into a social setting which is probably a good thing.

The in-house demos are another thing entirely. What do woodturners get out of watching other woodturners? Clearly it is because we think we will learn something new about our chosen passion. And we do! For me every time I see somebody turn a piece of wood I learn something. Be they a great, or a not so great. artisan, there are few who do the same thing the same way and watching how somebody else solves a problem stimulates the mind. I often have no intention of duplicating what a demonstrator is making, but the way it is made fires the imagination and makes the next project a little different from the last.

This is why the Chinook Woodturning Guild will continue to bring in guest artists, to kick start our own woodturning and open us up to possibilities and processes for our future development.

For your information:

Every year the Guild purchases insurance through the Society of Canadian Woodworkers. This insurance was set up by Colleen Samila, President of the Woodturners Guild of Ontario.

Many Canadian Guilds, including ours, had been buying annual insurance coverage through the AAW. When it was discovered that insurance was not honoured in Canada, Colleen invented the Society of Canadian Woodworkers and found an insurer which was prepared to give all members of the Society a group rate.

Part of your annual membership dues pay for our insurance.

Below is an overview of our coverage. (If you want more information, I am the wrong person to ask, instead email Colleen Samila colleen@canadian-woodworker.com.)

Be aware that if you are being paid to teach woodturning you are considered an instructor and require separate insurance. If you are not paid you are merely a mentor and are covered under this insurance as long as you are participating in a Guild event.

May Meeting



1) The evenings began with Roger McMullin discussing how to make wood burning pens used to embellish woodturnings. This method uses a 2-10 amp battery charger, connected to duplex plug/rotary dimmer switch combination. He demonstrated how the brands and wood burning pens could be constructed. The parts and pieces to make these pens are available but are usually sold in larger quantities and therefore somewhat prohibitive when making only one or two pens.



The guild members were asked to see if there was enough interest in the guild buying the materials and then in turn selling the parts to interested members. This would keep the cost down and would allow members access to this form of embellishment. The survey of the

members was done which indicated 9-10 members would like to participate.



information will be given to the executive who will then decide how to proceed.

2) Norm Robinson then showed the group a series of LED lights that were available for various shop applications including single lights and strip lighting. The distributor was not able to be present so pricing and more details were not readily available. 3) Terry Beaton discussed a hollowing tool he had fabricated. It had a carbide cutter attached to a metal 1/2" rod and handle. Alongside the rod was another "L" shaped rod which was welded to the side of the main rod. The purpose was to resist the rotational forced of the hollowing process by providing support against the banjo as hollowing is underway. Terry will host a sawdust session early in the fall for members who would like to give the finishing hollowing tool.

4) Ken Rude from Branches to Bowls (http://www.branchestobowls.com), a woodturning retailer from Calgary, who retails Vicmarc lathes and associated woodturning products, was present at the meeting. He provided an overview of all his products, along with a large selection of tools including Vicmarc chucks and jaws and Carter & Son beautiful gouges he had available for sale. 
Paul, and his wife Judy arrived a day early so as to have time to select wood and preside over the setup for the demo at Casa and the workshops.





The demonstration began with Paul giving a brief narrative of the path he has taken in developing his artistry from boyhood to its current level. The major portion of the morning was spent showing us how to select wood and shape an eye catching vessel. Paul pointed out that the best embellishment is wasted on a hollow form shape that does not please the eye, and









Special handle design

When the demonstration piece was formed on the outside it was coated with medium viscosity CA glue to prevent it from losing surface moisture and cracking while the hollowing was carried out. We were then treated to a Fennell style hollowing. Paul has developed his own home made hollowing tools and hollows with the lathe running in reverse. He says its more convenient and easier on the back and arms. It looks easy. Its not! Maybe I need more practice.

After the hollowing we were shown how to mark out surface grid lines so the piece could be carved in many different ways. Doing geometric indexing to help plan the carving is very simple, doing the carving, not so simple.







and then had a demonstration of an assortment of rotary tools Paul uses for carving the pattern onto and into the wood.











This was a day filled with new ideas for me and for the audience.

The next two days were hands-on workshops held in my shop (Casa was closed for Victoria Day). Paul invited us to work on whatever aspect of the demonstration we wished. Although we had enough lathes (Thank you Jim Jones) for everybody, few were used, as most decided to concentrate on indexing and embellishing. Some participants brought items from home to work on while others spent their time on thin practice boards using the high speed air powered carving tools available or the medium speed electric tools. Some had their own equipment from home, the rest used Paul's own tools or borrowed within the group. Norm Robinson provided the best lunch ever (who knew Norm could cook?) there was a great deal of circulating to see what others were doing and learn what worked and what didn't. Throughout, Paul circulated quietly, offering advice and answering questions.

The visiting woodturners asked to be put on our email list so they will know what is going on next year. Apparently it was a very successful event.
