



CHRISTMAS AT Casa SALE



Terry Beaton has summarized the sale results:

How to join a Zoom Meeting

This information is from a previous Central Alberta Woodturners newsletter

On desktop, tablet or phone by downloading the app.

- Download the **Zoom desktop app** on your Mac or PC. https://zoom.us/download
- 2. Open the **Zoom app**.
- 3. Click Join a Meeting.
- 4. Enter the **Meeting ID** and your **name**, and set **audio/video permissions**.

On desktop, tablet or phone via meeting invite link.

- Click on the Meeting Invite URL that the host shared
- 2. via email or text.
- 3. Open the **Zoom app**.
- 4. **Approve** the request for **permission** to use your computer's **audio and camera**.

Depending on the meeting's set-up:

- you may enter the meeting right away
- you may need to wait for the host to arrive first or
- you may be placed into a waiting room that the host controls.

Did you vote for the most stunning Christmas ornaments of the year? If yes, you know the web site. If not, you can still admire the ornaments at https://www.aswoodturns.com/challenges/2021-christmas-ornament-challenge/ and get inspired for a last minute gift or for next fall when to return to the ornament making. A very nice display of over 200 of mostly turned ornaments is presented. A few Canadians did participate including our colleague Bert Delisle from the Edmonton Guild with a collection of over 18 turned bells. Well done, Bert!

Kade Bolger is a very skilled Canadian production woodturner from Whitby, Ontario (www.kadebolger.com). On his website you can discover diverse types of vessels including bowls, spectacular boxes with finials, and hollow forms. Make sure you stop by his stunning 'Butterfly' turned from a red mallee burl. He also offers a few IRD (interactive remote demonstration) demonstrations. The thin walled live edge bowl one seems particularly interesting. This fall, he was offering an IRD on making Christmas ornaments: a Christmas tree, a snowman and Christmas globes with finials using only the skew. Our good friend Vern who did like his skew gouges would have smiled all along this presentation. Watch his web site as new demonstrations will be available this spring. Of course, he also offers his IRD to Guilds around the world.

Jacques Veserey is an acclaimed wood turner from Maine, USA. He is known for his embellishment work on his turned objects. His work is featured in modern art museums and private collections around the world. He has demonstrated in North America, Europe and Asia. He was a guest demonstrator at the South Saskatchewan Woodturners Guild Symposium in 2016. A few members of our Guild did attend this meeting that also featured J. Paul Fennell and David Ellsworth. I have been looking for some time to find his web site with no success. However, you can find information on his woodturning activities on different sites. A first one being the American Woodturners Association as he was selected as the Professional Outreach Program (POP) Merit Award recipient in 2015 (https://www.woodturner.org/common/Uploaded%20files/POPMeritAward/2015Vesery.pdf).
